FOREIGN AFFAIRS.

From the London Gazette, January 7, 1755.

Arriv'd a Mail from France.

Rome, Dec. 10.



HE Congregation for the Propagation of the Faith, have received an Account from their Missionaries in China, that the Persecution of the Christians is totally ceased in that Empire, and that they have at length obtained Permission again to preach the Gospel; which Advice has given such Satisfaction to the Pope, that publick Thanks are

ordered to be given on that Occasion.

Genoa, Dec. 7. We are informed by our last Letters from Madrid, that they continue to raise Recruits in all the Provinces of that Kingdom for completing their intended Augmentation of their Regiments of Foot. And 'tis said an Augmentation will also be speedily made of their Regiments of Horse.

Whitehall, January 7.

The King has been pleased to grant unto his Grace Charles Duke of Marlborough, the Office of Keeper of His Majesty's privy Seal, in the Room of the Right Honourable John Earl Gower his Father, deceased.

Paris, A la main, Dec. 30. An Action which happened last Week at a Village near Autun, between a Party of the Smugglers and Fischer's Regiment, has engrossed all Conversation for some Days. About forty of the Smugglers, pursued by the King's Troops, took Shelter in a Farm house of the Village abovementioned, and entrenched themselves. They were closely blockaded by our Troops, and it was expected every Moment they would surrender; but being determined to die or conquer, they set Fire to the Farm (by which nine of their own People perished) sallied out and forced their Way through the midst of their Enemies, killing several, and wounding many more. The Colonel of the King's Regiment, and divers Officers, are dangerously wounded. In the manner wherein the Smugglers are armed, they are able to make Head against five or six times their Number, for they have each six Shot.

The Bishop of Chartres has received an Order from the King to repair to his Diocese, and continue in it till further Notice.

WHEREAS it was found by Experience that the Turnpike Roads, and indeed other Roads, could not be kept in Repair, as there is now so much Waggoning and Carting, so long as narrow Wheels were used; which made the Broad Wheel Law become necessary: It is now seen that broad and narrow are inconsistent; that the broad go in the Coach Quarter, but do it no Harm, being rather a Service; that narrow will do the same, and thereby they much prejudice the Horse-Track for Travellers and Pack-Horses: So that some Alteration in that Law seems necessary this Session. It is admitted that broad Wheels might do on Turnpike Roads, were it not for the narrow; but then there should be some saving Clause in favour of the narrow Wheels, that don't go above a certain Length on the Turnpike Road, and then turn off. The broad Wheels take a deal of Wood, and unless the Number is reduced by the Alteration expected to be made, it will be advanced, and may become scarce; and the Waggoners will be inclined to keep on their Waggon, rather than keep Pack Horses, as it is well known that a narrow-wheel Waggon and six Horses will draw as much as twenty Pack Horses usually carry; for that then there is the Price and Keeping of fourteen Horses set against the Price and Wear of the Waggon, which is nothing like an Equivalent. It is therefore submitted to the Consideration of those concerned, Whether it would not answer to have nine Inches reduced to six, both as to Waggon and Carts, and to extend to Turnpike and all other Roads: Such a Breadth as six, it is supposed, would not damage the Roads greatly; and if it was made universal, yet it would not put Parishes to any more Expences than they now are at, because in beating in Ruts or levelling for narrow Wheels they never repair or level less than six Inches in Breadth, and then it would be but only uniting two Fellies which would be no great Expence or Inconvenience to

the Farmer, and soon save as much in the Repair of the Ways.

LONDON, January 7.

We hear there will be a Lottery this Year, for the Benefit of the Foundling Hospital.

We are well informed, that the Story of a Nobleman's killing one of his Domesticks, for being too familiar with his Lady, is absolutely false in every Part of it.

On Friday last a Servant to the Hon. Mr. King, of Albemarle Street, was sent by his Master to the Bank to get a Note for 500l. changed for small Notes, which he accordingly changed for fourteen Notes, (six of 50 l. four of 30 l. and four of 20 l. each) but has never since returned to his Master.

Thursday last about Noon, the Machine going from London to Chatham, with four French Gentlemen in it, was stopp'd by a single Highwayman near Gravesend Turnpike, who saluting the Gentlemen in English was not understood by them and the Coachman telling him he must speak French he said, "Polly voo, d-mn your Bloods, your Money," presenting at the same Time a Pistol; whereupon they gave him all their Money, but the Highwayman picking out the Gold, threw the Silver into the Coach again, and then rode off.

Yesterday the Right Hon. Earl Gower was at Court, for the first Time since the Decease of his Father, the late Earl, and delivered up the Privy Seal to his Majesty. And

The same Day his Grace the Duke of Marlborough kiss'd his Majesty's Hand, on being appointed Privy Seal, in room of the late Earl Gower.

On Saturday the Bodies of four Children, all putrified, except the Body of a Boy about a Month old, which was lately put there, were found under an Arch of the Stables the Bottom of Bolton-Row, near the Duke of Devonshire's Gardens; the Skulls of the Children seem'd all to be broke with a Hammer.

The following is an Account of taking of Joseph Gill and William Burk, the two Robbers mentioned in our last.

Mr. Fielding being informed that the Mother of one of these Rogues lodged at Hyde-Park Corner, and sold old Cloaths, sent one Mr. Gee, a Constable, and Mr. Pentelow, Keeper of New Prison, to make some Inquiry, on which a Plan might be formed to apprehend them. They accordingly went into an Alehouse, called the York-Minster, next Door to the Mother's, where, as Chance would have it, they saw the two Villains drinking together in a Back Room. The Thieves observing themselves noticed, paid their reckoning hastily, and attempted to pull off: The Constable seized one by the Collar, on which the other Rogue fired a Pistol in his Face, which, though loaded, only grazed his Cheek: Whereupon the Constable quitted his Prisoner, to pursue the Villain that fired at him; this gave the other an Opportunity to draw his Pistol, which he presented to the Head of Mr. Pentelow, who in an Instant, rushed in upon him, disarmed him, and by endeavouring to secure him, they both fell over a Water-Tub, by which Means the Rogue disengaged himself, and they both made their Escape; but the Mother being taken, an Account of their Lodging in Shadwell was obtained, and a strong Party set out the next Morning by Break of Day, to surprize them in their Beds; but they being alarmed by one of their Whores, retired to the Strand for Safety, where three Thief-Takers just returned from a private Expedition, had Intelligence of them, and rushing into the Room with drawn Hangers, desired them to surrender: Upon which the two Rogues started up, drew Pistols, and declared they would not be taken alive; but they were soon disarmed, and one of them, after receiving a Wound or two, submitted; but the other though his Hand that held the Pistol was almost cut off, and he had received many Wounds in his Face and Head, would not surrender till he was totally overpowered, and till the great Loss of Blood had rendered him incapable of further Resistance.

Yesterday were re-examined before Mr. Fielding, the two different Gangs of Highwaymen. Against several of them positive Evidence appeared, as there did also against two Persons for receiving the Goods from the Highwaymen, knowing them to be stolen. Joseph Gill, one of the Highwaymen, behaved with an uncommon Assurance before the Magistrate, and when he went into the Coach to be conveyed to Newgate, said, that if he was well mounted, and had a Brace of good Pistols, upon Honour and Health, he would not care two Pence for the Justice, Constables, Thief-Takers or Guards.

Some Thoughts on Holidays.

THE Institution of the Sabbath, or as Christians stile it, the Lord's Day, seems to have been a Part of the ancient Patriarchial Religion, and to have been afterwards accommodated to the Jewish and Christian Dispensations. The setting aside other Seasons of Gladness and Holydays,

belongs in a peculiar Manner to those Revelations, and seems very properly calculated to maintain the Sense and Belief of them in the Minds of those who sincerely adhere to either of these Religions.

But still the Sabbath is the great Catholick Holiday, prescribed by Divine Institution, and that for the wisest Purposes, the Enjoyment of Rest, and the Exercise of Contemplation. But for this Interposition Men would wear themselves out, and as far as their Influence would extend, wear others out in a never ceasing Application to the Business of this World. But these recurring Seasons of Rest afford them Leisure to reflect, that they are rational Creatures, and give them Time to remember, that in another Life they are to account for their Actions in this.

We may from hence discern, why Irreligion and Immorality necessarily attend the Contempt and Abuse of the Sabbath. For the Recess from Labour being preserv'd by those who make no Conscience of devoting that Rest to its proper Use, they consequently turn to their Destruction what was instituted for their Salvation, verifying that old and just Observation, that the best Things, when corrupted become the worst.

The Christian Feasts were instituted on the Model of Jewish, and respect the three great Myseries, of our Religion: The Incarnation, or Manifestation of God in the Flesh, the Crucifixion, and Resurrection of our Lord; which answers to the Passover; and the Pentecost, or Descent of the Holy Ghost on the Disciples, to qualify them for the Propagation of the Gospel amongst all Nations. The serious and thorough Explanation of these great Events, is sufficient to demonstrate the Truth of the Evangelic History, and to persuade Men that there cannot be either an easier, or a faster, Road to future Happiness, than that which has been pointed out to them in the Gospel.

Assigning proper Seasons in which to consider Points of so high Consequence, and allowing a reasonable Space for Relaxation, in which they might be leisurely consider'd; comprehending them also within the Compass of a Year, was admirably suited to keep up the distinct Knowledge, and a thorough Persuasion of our Holy Religion, amongst all Sorts of People.

But to preserve only the Outside, and the Appearances, and to forget the essential and beneficial Part, is suitable enough to the Custom of the present Age; and must necessarily tend to place, in a very depreciating Point of View, what was truly excellent in the original Intention. Yet a Moment's Attention will shew us, that it is not the Ordinances of our Ancestors, but the Perverfeness of our own Practice, that renders these ridiculous, and even mischievous. We may fancy ourselves wiser than our Forefathers, and treat their Usages as idle and superstitious; but Posterity will do them Justice at our Expence, and by reforming their Abuses, make Holidays what they formerly were: Times set apart for the Honour of GOD, and the Edification of Men.

There is no doubt that in the Time of Popery, as other Points, both of Doctrine and Discipline, were exceedingly abused, so this of Holidays was far from escaping. Their Processions in the Street; their Representations in Churches; their placing so much Merit in ridiculous Ceremonies, were inconsistent with the Purity, and derogatory from the Dignity of the Gospel. It is no Wonder, therefore, that wise Men saw the Folly and Iniquity of this, or that the Vulgar should be sharp-sighted enough to see it likewise, when these Practices came to be exposed.

But surely nothing of this Sort can possibly be imputed to the Church of England; which in this, as in other Things has kept the true Medium between Superstition and Indecency; and after laying aside whatever had been brought in by Fraud, or accumulated by Ignorance, restored that noble Simplicity of Worship with which it became rational Beings to acknowledge the Wisdom, and to express a grateful Sense of the Goodness of their Creator.

The Holidays in our Church are not so numerous as to interfere with the necessary Occupations of civil Life; the Portions of Time assign'd them are sufficient for Devotion and Relaxation; and the Offices appointed are decent, clear, pathetic, and free from all Exceptions. If therefore, forgetting our Duty and our Reason, we slight these Ordinances and devote to Idleness and Luxury those Spaces set apart for better Purposes; we only furnish the strongest Testimonies possible against the new Opinions, and involuntary do the greatest Honour to the Doctrine and Discipline of that Church, which it is almost become fashionable to discredit and despise.

Last Tuesday Evening a young Woman went into St. Martin's Roundhouse, said she came out of Kent, and that her Mother had been lately most barbarously murdered at a House in Dartford, and her Body, as she believed, delivered to the Surgeons. She was carried before Justice Cox, where declaring much to the same Effect, she was detain'd for further Examination.

The Ball at St. James's on Twelfth Night was not over till early on Tuesday Morning. His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales danced with the Marchioness of Rockingham. His Majesty withdrew from the Hazard Table after Eleven o'Clock; and his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland was the most considerable Winner.

On Tuesday his Grace the Duke of Rutland kiss'd his Majesty's Hand on being appointed Lord Steward of the

Honfield in the Room of the Duke of Marlborough, and the White Wand was delivered to him.

FOREIGN AFFAIRS.

Arriv'd a Mail from France.

Peterburgh, Dec 10.

HEY talk at Court of raising 60,000 Recruits this Winter to reinforce the Empress's Armies.

Naples, Dec. 10. Since the 4th Instant we have been terribly alarmed, by Eruptions from Mount Vefuvius in three different Places.

Paris, Jan 4. The States of Provence have granted the King a Free Gift of 700,000 Livres, besides the ordinary Subsidies.

After the Skirmish, which Madrin had with Fischer's Regiment, he sent a Message to that Colonel, threatening to treat our Prisoners as Fischer should treat his, four of whom (according to some Accounts) were broke upon the Wheel.

Madrid gives his Men thirty Sols per Day.

The Merchants of Bourdeaux, Rochelle, and other Western Ports of this Kingdom, have received an Account of a terrible Hurricane at St Domingo, whereby a great Number of the Plantations in that Island have been destroyed, and ten or twelve Ships, laden with Sugar, cast away upon the Coast.

LONDON, January 9, 1754.

They write from Madrid, that the Duke de Duras, the French Ambassador, has concluded a new Treaty with the Spanish Ministry, which confirms all former Engagements between the Crowns of France and Spain, and stipulates in particular, that the Subjects of the former shall enjoy all Commercial Advantages in the Spanish Dominions that may be allowed by Treaties concluded with other Powers.

We hear that Lord Cadogan is appointed Colonel of the Second Regiment of Foot Guards, in the room of the late Earl of Albemarle.

That Lord Tyravley will have Lord Cadogan's Troop of Life Guards.

And that the Earl of Albemarle will have Lord Tyravley's Regiment of Dragoons.

On Monday the Right Hon. the Marquis of Winchester was, without Opposition, elected Knight of the Shire for the County of Southampton, in the room of his Father, now Duke of Bolton.

Henry Drax, Esq; and Capt. Augustus Pitt, of the Foot Guards are elected Members for Warrham.

On the 16th ult. was seized on the River Thames a Brigantine, called the Industry, with 4704 Yards, or thereabouts, of Irish Cambrics, within the said Vessel, for having had laden on board her, in the Port of Cork in Ireland, the said Woolen Goods, in order to carry the same to some Port beyond the Seas, contrary to the Statute: And on the 21st Instant two Justices of the Peace will meet in Whitechapel, to proceed to the Condemnation of the said Cambrics and the Vessel, with all her Appurtenances.

On Monday Night about nine o'Clock a Fire broke out in the Stables belonging to the Right Hon. the Dowager Lady Carpenter, in Lee's Mews, North Audley Street, which burnt down two Stables, burnt the Coachman's Child to Death, and two Horses.

They write from Ulk, in Monmouthshire, that on the 26th past, William Shepard, of that Place, Shoemaker, most barbarously murdered his Wife by knocking her Brains out with a large Hammer. We hear he quarrelled with her because she laid one Night with her Friends longer than he expected. He is a strong luffy Man, and made his Escape out of a Window from some Neighbours, who had come in upon hearing an extraordinary Noise.

Extract of a Letter from Troyes in Champagne, dated December 23.

It was on the 18th inst. at Two o'Clock in the Morning, that the Judges of the Bailiwick issued the Sentence which condemned our Bishop to pay a Fine of 3000 Livres, for withholding the Sacraments from one Jorry, a Taylor, as mentioned last Post. The Prelate having refused to pay this Sum, they proceeded to a Distress on his Goods, the Sale of which produced but 2400 Livres.

The 19th they seized his Revenues and Temporalities, and all the Writings of the Process were sent to Paris.

This Day the Right Hon. the Earl of Egmont was sworn one of his Majesty's Most honourable Privy Council.

The following remarkable Instance of Generosity, may be acceptable to our Readers, and the more so, as it has happened within the last six Months. Sempronius had a fine Estate, and lived in great Harmony with Marius; the former having a large Family, was obliged to mortgage his Estate, and at different Times borrowed of Marius; 2000 l. in about seven Years: At last, being in great Distress he advertised his Estate and Mansion House to be sold. When Marius saw the Advertisement, he sent for Sempronius, and desired him to open his Heart, and rely on the Friendship of Marius, who immediately ferched the Writings of Sempronius's Estate, and delivered them to him, together with a general Release.

By the Act of Parliament, lately passed for the relief of the Out-pensioners of Chelsea College, their Pensioners for the future, are to be paid in the Country, by the Receivers General of the Land Tax, who are to receive 6 d. in the

round; whereas before a Set of Men called Ufurers, received it; who extorted near one third of the Pension from the poor Pensioners; those within ten Miles of London, are to be paid at an Office appointed.
