Whitehall, Aug. 26.



Y His Majesty's Ship the Sea-Horse, from Virginia Advice has been received, that Major General Braddock, having advanced with 2000 Men, and all the Stores, and Provisions, to the Little Meadows (about 20 Miles beyond Fort Cumberland, at Wills's Creek) found it necessary to leave the greatest Part of his Waggon, &c. at that Place, under the Command of Colonel Dunbar, with a Detachment of 800 Men, ordering him to follow as fast as the Nature of the Service would admit. The General having by this Means lessened his Line of March, proceeded with great Expedition, his Corps then consisting of about 1200 Men, and 10 Pieces of Artillery, together with the necessary Ammunition, Stores and Provisions. On the 8th of July, he encamped within Ten Miles of Fort Duquesne; and, on the 9th, on his March through the Woods towards that Fort, was attacked by a Body of French and Indians, who made a sudden Fire from the Woods, which put the Troops into great Confusion, and occasioned their retiring with great Precipitation, notwithstanding all the Endeavours of the General, and the Officers, many of whom were killed, whilst they were using all possible Means to rally the Men. The General, who exerted himself as much as Man could do, after having five Horses killed under him, was shot through the Arm, and the Lungs, of which he died the fourth Day. Sir Peter Halket was killed on the Spot. Two of the General's Aids de Camp (Capt. Orme, and Capt. Morris) were wounded. His Secretary (Son to Governor Shirley) was killed. Sir John St. Clair, Quarter Master General, and his Assistant, Mr. Leisle, both wounded. It is reckoned, that there were about 200 killed, and 400 wounded; the latter are mostly collected at Wills's Creek, to which Place Colonel Dunbar, with the Remainder of the Troops, was retired; from whom a more particular Account is expected.

Halifax in Nova Scotia, July 18, 1755.

THE French have abandoned their Fort at St. John's River, and, as far as it was in their Power, demolished it. As soon as the Forts upon the Isthmus were taken, Capt. Rous sailed from thence with three Twenty Gun Ships, and a Sloop, to look into St. John's River, where it was reported there were two French Ships, of Thirty six Guns each: He anchored off the Mouth of the River, and sent his Boats to reconnoitre; they found no Ships there, but on their Appearance, the French burst their Cannon, blew up their Magazine, burned every Thing they could, belonging to the Fort, and marched off: The next Morning the Indians invited Captain Rous on Shore, gave him the strongest Assurances of their Desire to make Peace with the English; and pleaded in their Behalf, that they had refused to assist the French upon this Occasion, tho' earnestly pressed by them. Some of their Chiefs are expected at Halifax in a very few Days.

FOREIGN AFFAIRS.

Arriv'd a Mail from France.

Compeigne, Aug. 1 Councils still continue very frequent, and fresh Orders are daily issued in consequence of the Measures therein concerted relating to the War which we shall probably soon have with the English. The great Point we labour at is the Augmentation of the Marine, which we propose to make much more powerful than it ever was. We are already employed in doubling the Companies of the Quarter-Deck and Poop Guards.

The King hath taken a Resolution to keep constantly in Dunkirk Harbour ten Ships of the Line and fifteen or twenty Frigates, always ready to put to Sea on the shortest Notice. Paris, Aug. 2. A Vessel arrived at Rochelle brings Advice that the French Squadron is arrived at its Destination, except the two Ships that were taken by the English. M. de Salvert, with his Division, consisting of five Ships, is got into Louisbourg, and has landed there two Battalions; and the Count de la Mothe is arrived at Canada, and landed four other Battalions. The Troops are all in good Health, and desire nothing more than to be led to the Enemy. Their Presence has revived the Courage of the People of Canada, who now think themselves strong enough to keep Possession of what the English pretend to dispute with them.

AMERICAN NEWS.

Boston in New England, June 12. A Body of 2,500 Men, under the Command of our Governor, is now on its March for the great Falls of Niagara, between the Lakes Erie and Ontario: another, of 3,500 Men, under the Command of Gen. Johnson, is now on its March to attack Crown Point, but they will not be at the Places of Action this Month or six Weeks, as their Marches are very long. The Crown Point Expedition is entirely at the Expence of the Northern Colonies.

LONDON, August 26.

The Particulars of General Braddock's Defeat are thus related: The French Troops were posted at Fort du Quesne, on the River Ohio, and consisted of 1500 Regulars, and 600 Irregulars: who, being informed of Braddock's Design to attack them, marched out, and encamped about six Miles to the Southward of their Fort, on a very advantageous Piece of Ground, where they fortified their Camp in a most judicious Manner. When Braddock appeared they were drawn out of their Lines, and prepared for his Reception: General Braddock's Army consisted of two Irish Regiments of 700 Men each, and 1000 new raised Men of Virginia, Maryland, and North Carolina, including the independent Company from South Carolina, formed from the reduced Men of General Oglethorpe's late Regiment of Foot, and about 100 Indians. Upon General Braddock's coming in View of the French, he immediately formed, and ordered the Attack. Colonels Gage and Burton (who are both killed) commanded the Wing which began the Attack, which continued fierce on both Sides; but the two Irish Regiments, after receiving the Enemy's second Fire, were in Confusion, and deserted their Officers, who behaved gallantly, and whilst they were doing all in their Power to rally them, several were cut to Pieces: With much Difficulty they did rally them, but were deserted by them again upon the Enemy's first Fire; and the Officers again attempted to rally them, but to no Purpose. The Americans behaved with the utmost Fortitude, and made great Slaughter amongst the French. Had the Irish Regiments done their Duty, General Braddock would have gained a complete Victory. By their ill Behaviour he was totally defeated; having 60 Officers killed and wounded, 800 Soldiers killed upon the Spot, and Cannon, Tents, Baggage, Provisions, and private Papers, all taken; almost every Thing falling into the Enemy's Hands.

On Sunday and Yesterday a great Number of Messengers were dispatched to the several Ports, and also to Hanover.

The Ship of Capt. Taggart is arrived at Nova Scotia, with Cannon and Ammunition, in six Weeks from London.

Last Tuesday Morning arrived in Bristol Road, the St. Andrew, Olive, from Greenland, with one Sea-Horse and eleven Seals.

The Rev. Thomas Allen, B. A. was a few Days since presented to the Vicarage and Parish Church of Littenbury, in the County of Cornwall and Diocese of Exeter, vacant by the Resignation of the old Incumbent.

On Sunday Morning, between One and Two o'Clock, two Hobbes in the Occupation of one Burnett, who keeps a Chandler's Shop in Newton's Lane, Holborn, and a Barber next Door, fell down to the Ground; and, as they were let out chiefly to poor People, nine Persons were buried in the Ruins. A Woman and a young Child were found crushed to Death, and carried in a Shell to St. Giles's Round house; six were sent to the Middlesex Hospital, some of whom had their Limbs broke; and all were so much bruised, that only two are expected to recover. A poor Man, upwards of eighty Years old, was the last that was dug out, without any seeming Hurt; and the numerous Multitude, assembled on this Occasion, made a handsome Collection for him, with which the old Man walked off, seemingly well pleased with his good Fortune.

On Sunday Evening as some Persons who had been down the River on a Party of Pleasure, were returning, the Boat overfet; whereby Mr. Davis a Taylor, the Owner of the Boat; Mr. Broadgate, a Coal Merchant; and a Tobacco-niff near St. Margaret's Hill, Southwark, were drowned: A Lad the Gentlemen lifted to land with them to attend them was taken up by a Fisherman.

Last Wednesday died at Bath, after a tedious Illness, his Grace the Duke of Roxburgh.

We hear the late General Braddock, after he was mortally wounded, declared that he was thoroughly satisfied with the Conduct of his Officers, as no Men could behave better than they did; and that he wrote a short Letter to his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland, to the same Purpose. This brave General, after he received the fatal Shot, desired to be held up, that he might appear as unhurt, in order to animate the Troops; which was accordingly done by two wounded Officers.

The Baggage, Military Chest, and a great many Troops, retired in good Order to Philadelphia, and are now at Will's Creek: So that, upon the whole, we are in hopes the Affair will not prove so bad as at first represented.

Yesterday his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland came to Town, up till Four this Morning.

The Yachts are ordered to sail from Greenwich by the Morning's Tide, and if the Wind continues, is conjectured will immediately be dispatched from thence to Hanover, with the Account of their Arrival; and thence to leave his Majesty's German Dominions.

We hear that the late Sir Robert Grosvenor, Bart. left his estate to his son, the present Sir Robert, in real and personal Estate, to the Amount of 600,000 l. a fine Estate to his second son Thomas; a large Jointure to his Lady; and 30,000 l. to each of his three Daughters.

The Cavalier has been lately public at the French Court—and the Person that lately landed at Harwich is supposed to be an Agent of his; but it is hoped before this Time that he is secured, as a printed Description of him has been lately dispersed through the Kingdom, by Means of the Excise Office.

Extract of a Letter from Will's Creek, July 10, 1755.
Dear Sir, I send you the following melancholy Account.

On the 6th of July, General Braddock near Frazers Settlement, six Miles to the South of Fort du Quebec on the Monongahela River, came up with the French Army of 1500 Regulars and 600 Irregulars drawn out of their Lines, they having made Choice of a very advantageous Ground, and entrenched in a masterly Manner: General Braddock with Sir Peter's Regiment of 700, and Col. Dunbar's of 700, with 1200 Virginians, Marylanders and Carolinians, and 100 Indians advanced against them. Before our Men could get within Mulquet Shot of the French, the Indians in Ambuscade surprised our Army by firing singly at the General and other particular Officers; and as soon as Colonels Gage and Burton had begun the Attack, which was very fierce, the Indians immediately gave the War-Hoop, and rising from the Thickets, discovered themselves, when the advanced Guard being then between three Fires gave Way, and was rallied by their Officers, gave one Fire and then retreated in the greatest Confusion imaginable, till they had thrown Dunbar's Regiment into Disorder: their Officers with a great deal of Trouble, after having run several Men through, rallied them a second Time, when they fired a Fire from the French, and without returning it retired in great Disorder with Dunbar's Regiment, and left their Officers a Sacrifice to the Enemy, and out of Sixty of them but five escaped, being either killed or wounded. The Virginians, &c. engaged afterwards closely for three Hours, but were obliged to retire.

* They use neither Drum nor Trumpet, nor any kind of musical Instrument in their Wars; their Troops serve them on all Occasions, where such are necessary. Many of them have a surprising Faculty of raising their Voice, not only in articulate Sounds, but likewise to make their Words understood at a great Distance.

FOREIGN AFFAIRS.

Arriv'd the Mails from France and Holland.

Riga, August 1.

THE 60,000 Men quartered in Livonia, and the neighbouring Provinces, and which are chiefly Foot, have received Orders to be ready to march on the shortest Notice.

Copenhagen, Aug. 12. Orders are given for completing all our Troops, and it is rumoured, that they will speedily be augmented with some thousand Men.

Milan, Aug. 3. It is given out here, that Proposals have been made to the Courts of Turin and Modena to come into the Measures of the Crown of Great-Britain and her Allies, in Consideration of large Subsidies, for which they should keep a certain Number of Troops in Readiness for Action, but only in case any Attempts be made to disturb the Tranquillity of Italy.

Hanover, Aug. 12. The Earl of Holderness return'd this Evening from Brunswick, whither he went to execute a Commission with the Duke of Wolfenbuttel.

The Marriage of the Prince of Wales is no more talked of; it is generally thought that the Conclusion of this Alliance is put off for some Time.

Brussels, Aug. 15. The warlike Preparations of the French in our Neighbourhood still continue, but are not so considerable as they were said to be. They seem at present to be chiefly intent upon repairing the Batteries at Dunkirk.

With regard to the French Naval Preparations, we hear that they are carried on with the greatest Expedition in all the Ports of the Kingdom, in order to fit out a Squadron of nineteen Ships, viz. one of 80 Guns, three of 74, five of 64, five of 60, and five of 50.

LONDON, August 28, 1755.

By Letters from Boston, in New-England, dated July 7, we are informed, that his Excellency the Captain-General had commissioned proper Officers to raise 500 Men more, to reinforce the Army designed to attack Crown Point.

They write from New-York, that Major General Shirley arrived there the 2d of July from Boston, and sail'd from thence the 4th with a fair Wind for Albany, and that the same Day six Sloops, with the Remainder of Major General Pepperell's Regiment, several Carriages for Field Pieces, and a great Quantity of warlike Stores, sail'd for the same Place.

On Tuesday his Majesty's Ship the Swiftsure, of 70 Guns, was put into Commission, and the Command of her given to the Hon. Augustus Keppel.

The Matter of a Ship just arriv'd from Cadiz, who was in Company with the French Squadron two Days, says, they were steering their Course for the Western Islands; and as Admiral Hawke is cruising off those Islands, it's hoped we shall soon have a good Account of them.

Two Ships of 80 Guns, fifteen from 60 to 74 Guns, four Frigates, three Bomb-Vessels, and nine Gallies are fitting out at Toulon.

We learn from Hanover that two Negotiations are in great Forwardness; for taking 5000 of the Duke of Wurtemberg's Troops, and another for taking 4,000

of those of Hesse-Darmstadt, in the Pay of Great Britain.

From Paris they tell us, that the King has received a Courier from the Chevalier de la Touche, his Minister at Berlin, with very satisfactory Dispatches; and that his Most Christian Majesty is not less satisfied with the Dispatches brought by a second Courier from Madrid, since they had the News of the taking of two French Men of War by Admiral Boscawen's Squadron.

Advices from Florence of the 2d inst. inform us, that the last Dispatches the Regency received from Vienna, concern the March of a Body of Austrian Troops that is to be sent from Germany to Lombardy. They likewise say, that the Imperial Court has received Advice from its Minister at Constantinople, that the late Grand Vizir, Ali Bahaw-Hekim-Oglou, is recalled from his Exile, and sent to command an Army of 50,000 Men, assembled on the Side of Crim-Tartary.

His Majesty will set out from Hanover next Monday Evening, and purposes being here this Day Fortnight, Wind and Weather permitting.

The French Fleet sail'd from Cadiz the 1st of August. The William and Nancy kept Company with them a whole Day, and gives an Account that they steer'd to the Northward.

Admiral Hawke was cruising off Cape Finisterre the 8th inst.

By the last Letters from Admiral Boscawen's Fleet cruising off Loughborough we learn, that the French Fleet by being to long confined in that Harbour, and the People without any Exercise, or fresh Provisions, that Place not affording them any Thing but Fish, was become so feckly, that it was thought they would not have Hands enough left alive to sail their Ships home.

The same Letters mention, that the Garrison were reduced to live upon Salt Provisions and Fish, and that Flour was so scarce, that there was not sufficient to support the Garrison a Month—This gave rise to the report Yesterday, that six French Men of War were taken; and that Loughborough had surrendered to Admiral Boscawen. As this is what there is reason to expect from the want of Provisions there, fainthearted Persons were willing to foretell the News, by way of Balance to the Misfortune on the Ohio.

By the Death of General Braddock, the command of the Troops devolves on Col. Dunbar, and as our battering Cannon have not fallen into the Enemy's Hands, it is not doubted that the Troops will soon be recruited, and under vigilant an Officer our Loss repaired, and returned upon the Enemy.

It is rumoured that most of the Officers were kill'd by the European Troops firing upon them when they endeavoured to rally them; and that very few of our Men were killed by the Enemy; in short, that a just Account of this Action would disclose such a Scene as was never seen before in our, nor perhaps in any other Army.

By a Letter from an Officer at Fort Cumberland, dated June 18, we learn, that when they took Beaujeu, they found there twenty four Cannon, plenty of Ammunition and Provision, to have held out a long Siege; and though the French fired five hundred Shot and eighty Shells at them, they had but one Man killed; that there never was so considerable a Conquest with so little Loss; they imputed their surrendering to foot to four French Officers being killed by one of the Shells, which went into a Room amongst them. The New Englandmen have gained great Glory by the Bravery they shewed on this Occasion; they had only two hundred and Fifty Royal Forces with them, on taking the above Fort; another at Bay Vert and Gaspereau surrendered on Terms.
